Choosing a category, or Rolling a dice, where each number or symbol represents one of the 7 categories.

Another team reads a trivia question from that category.

A correct answer earns the team the card.

An incorrect answer allows other teams to try and steal the card.

Winning Options:

Option A:

Collect one complete set (Question + Story card) from each of the 7 categories.

Option B:

Collect a full series of all 5 cards from one single category (for example, all 5 "Sports" cards).
